The Child Safeguarding Statement of the Catholic Institute for Deaf People (CIDP)

This statement has been prepared to comply with the requirements of the Children First Act 2015.

1 Statement

CIDP is committed to the creation and maintenance of a welcoming, nurturing and safe environment for all children. CIDP supports the physical, spiritual, social, educational and moral development of each young Deaf person so that she or he may take their place in society as a mature person. CIDP operates within a Christian ethos that welcomes children from all backgrounds and faith traditions.

CIDP recognises the right of every child to dignity of life and bodily integrity and is committed to ensuring that she or he is respected, nurtured, cared for and protected. This commitment is binding on all those who work for and on behalf of CIDP.

2 Nature of service and principles to safeguard children from harm

CIDP provides the following services to children:

The Boarding Campuses operates under the patronage of the Catholic Institute for Deaf People, to provide care for young Deaf girls and boys of school going age who attend The Holy Family School for the Deaf. We provide a *'home away from home'* environment, where we support the educational, emotional, and social development of the Boarders. Boarders reside with us from Sunday to Friday and Escorts are provided for those who commute long distances on public transport from all four corners of Ireland.

Safeguarding principles

CIDP endeavours to provide an environment for young Deaf people (persons up to the age of 18 years) that is welcoming, nurturing and safe by:

- Adopting a child centred approach;
- Working in partnership with parents and guardians;
- Choosing carefully those who work with children;
- Ensuring that those who work for an on behalf of CIDP understand what is expected of them in their dealings with children;
- Making proper arrangements for children, on and off the CIDP campus;
- Keeping good records.

3 Risk Assessment

CIDP has carried out an assessment of the potential for harm to children who avail of the services it provides. The following lists the identified risks and the practices and procedures in place for managing these risks.
