Reach Deaf Services has maintained a robust recruitment drive across the second quarter of 2025.

In June 2025, our Supported Living Services reached capacity for Community Support Workers. However, Recruitment is ongoing for a number of Community Social Care Leads. The Supported Living Services also extended some current Acting Up positions that are in place such as Acting up Community Support Managers & Practice Lead.

In Early March 2025 Interviews were held for back-filling one of our Operations Administrator roles which was successfully offered and commenced in Mid-April 2025.

In our Boarding Campus, Recruitment and interviews are ongoing internally for one Social Care Worker vacancy and there is one remaining vacancy for Transport Escort.

In early June 2025, Reach Deaf Services advertised a new vacancy for a Part-Time Accounts Assistant. This vacancy is ongoing in application processing and will be live until late June 2025.

In early May 2025, Interviews were held for the Reach Deaf Services, HR Manager vacancy. After a successful interview and role offer, this position is due to commence in Mid-July 2025. We wish a warm welcome to all who have joined or are soon to join our services.

Our services have maintained steady schedules across all mandatory staff training fields such as, Adult Safeguarding & Child Protection, Manual & People Moving and Handling, Medication Management, Risk Management along with Tool talks in Service User Finance safeguarding and Trust in Care policy Training for applicable roles. Our HR department will also be engaged in upcoming information seminars such as the Work and Access scheme with the Department of Social Protection and Deaf village Ireland and with The Wheel: Inclusive Design to Delight Untapped Talent in June 2025.

Some staff who are involved in our payroll function commenced an IPASS certificate in Payroll Techniques in February 2025 which is ongoing.

The Implementation of Reach Deaf Services' new Care/Payroll system, One Touch Health is in full swing and nearing the final finishing touches. All staff are now utilizing this application for recording their working times and managing absence records. The system is being further prepared for Handover reporting/incident reporting amongst other operational processes. Consultations are ongoing between our Internal One Touch Health Focus team and One Touch Healths Support team to ensure full benefit of the systems abilities are utilized and internal training is also ongoing for all staff who are involved in the functioning of the One Touch Health system.

Active Church Ministry

Eight Deaf Candidates from Holy Family School received the Sacrament of Confirmation from Fr Paddy Boyle, Chaplain to Deaf People, in Emmaus Chapel. The Archbishop gave permission to Parish priests/ chaplains to do the Confirmation ceremony because the numbers of schools had grown in the dioceses and the priests are there to support the Archbishop with this work.

Their class teacher along with the SNA provided a lovely liturgy and the Candidates were involved in the signing songs during the service. Their parents/guardians must be feeling proud to see how well they are doing in entering a new phase in life. May the holy spirit be their guide and helper throughout their young lives in the days and months ahead.

Sacrament of the Eucharist.

Eight Deaf Children received their 1st Confession in Emmaus Chapel. With Fr Paddy Boyle as their confessor, in early May as preparation for their 1st Holy Communion. They have been learning about Jesus who loved each child and he wanted them to be his friend. They learnt how to be a friend to each other and grow in friendship with Jesus in their lifetime. They received their 1st Holy Communion on 13th June 2025 in Emmaus Chapel. The family were there supporting them and liturgy was organised by their class teacher with her SNA. Everyone involved participated in the signing songs and prayers.

We wish them well and may they continue to pray at home with their families and in places of prayer.

Summary of Jubilee Year Pilgrimage with Irish & American Deaf Groups

In celebration of the Jubilee Year, which occurs every 25 years, a unique joint pilgrimage brought together Deaf communities from Ireland, Scotland, America, and other parts of Europe for a spiritually rich journey to Rome and other sacred sites in Italy. A total of 11 Irish pilgrims, joined by a Scottish couple and 26 Americans, traveled together. They were accompanied throughout the trip by travel agent Chris Dube, a local guide, and a coach driver.

Upon arrival in Rome, the group learned of the passing of Pope Francis just days earlier. The original plans were respectfully altered to accommodate the nine-day mourning period observed across the Vatican. Despite the unexpected turn of events, the pilgrims found themselves part of a historical moment. On their first evening, they gathered in silence in St Peter's Square, illuminated at night, to pray and reflect in solidarity. Fr Patrick Mullan, a hearing chaplain from Washington, D.C., led a powerful Rosary in American Sign Language (ASL), which was mirrored in Irish Sign Language (ISL) by the group.

The following day, after waiting in long queues, they entered St Peter's Basilica and joined thousands in silent prayer during a special Italian Mass, with bishops and cardinals concelebrating. The sacred atmosphere left a deep impression on the group. They later visited the Maria Maggiore Basilica just outside the Vatican Walls. Here, they followed in the footsteps of the late Pope Francis, who used to pray privately before his foreign journeys. His simple white marble tomb inscribed "Franciscus" was a focal point for quiet contemplation. A private Mass was celebrated in a side chapel of the Basilica, with full ASL and ISL interpretation, offering a moment of spiritual intimacy.

The group's main purpose for traveling was to attend a three-day Vatican conference focused on "Evangelization – Sharing the Good News", organized by the Dicastery for Laity, Family, and Life. Participants had the opportunity to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation from Deaf and hearing priests fluent in sign language—an incredibly meaningful and inclusive experience.



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On the second day of the conference, sign language interpreters faced difficulties due to the variety of languages being used and a lack of clear scheduling. Through collaboration and networking, they managed to overcome these challenges, ensuring full participation for the Deaf attendees. Presentations were delivered by Deaf and Deafblind speakers who shared how they live their faith through vocations such as marriage, single life, priesthood, and religious commitment. These personal testimonies offered inspiration and insight into how vocation is lived in different ways. The day concluded with a Mass celebrated by Bishop Piero Fisichella. He then led the Deaf pilgrims in a short but moving procession through the Holy Door of St Peter's Basilica, a traditional act during Jubilee Years that grants a special indulgence. They were blessed with the Jubilee Cross surrounded by stunning religious art, enhancing the spiritual depth of the moment.

The pilgrims also learned about the special Jubilee indulgences available by making pilgrimages, praying, and attending the Holy Doors of four major basilicas: St Peter's, St Paul Outside the Walls, St John Lateran, and Maria Maggiore. In an extraordinary move, Pope Francis had added a fifth Holy Door—this one located in a nearby prison he frequently visited, reflecting his commitment to inclusion and mercy. From Rome, the group journeyed north to Assisi, birthplace of St Francis. There they explored his early life, marked by privilege and a dramatic decision to renounce wealth and embrace a life of poverty. In Assisi, they also visited the Church of St Clare and were moved to discover that their visit coincided with the birthday of Blessed Carlo Acutis, a young computer prodigy who used his skills to spread devotion to the Eucharist before dying at 15. They viewed his remains in a glass coffin and learned about his upcoming canonization originally set for April 2025 but postponed to September. Another young role model, Bl Pier Giorgio Frassati, who died at 24, is also set for canonization in 2025, making both figures especially relevant for young Catholics today.

Their final destination was Orvieto, south of Assisi, known for the Eucharistic Miracle of Bolsena, where a blood-stained corporal (altar cloth) is displayed in a side chapel. The group admired the artistic depictions and took time to reflect on the powerful miracle, which strengthened belief in the Real Presence in the Eucharist.

Throughout the trip, Fr Patrick Mullan celebrated private Masses in ASL at various chapels and convents. Irish pilgrims were supported with ISL interpretation, and American Sign Language interpreters provided voiceovers when needed. Free time allowed for self-guided exploration and social bonding. By the end of the pilgrimage, the Deaf groups had developed deeper connections, formed new friendships, and shared a renewed sense of faith. The journey offered unforgettable experiences rooted in prayer, community, culture, and history—leaving lasting spiritual memories in the hearts of all who participated.





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
